REQUIREMENTS

CORE CURRICULUM The Core Curriculum is designed to foster critical thinking skills and introduce students to basic domains of thinking that transcend disciplines. The Core applies to all majors. Information on specific classes in the Core can be found at marshall.edu/gened.



MAJOR-SPECIFIC

All Communication Disorders majors are required to take the following courses:

- · Students are required to know and track their degree requirements for graduation or for entrance to a professional school.
- · Course offerings and course attributes are subject to change semesters. Please consult each semesters schedule of courses for availability and attributes.
- The first five courses in the program (CD 101, 228, 229, 239, 241) are available to all students who have declared Communication Disorders as their major. Upon completion of these courses, students may apply to gain permission to continue in the CD program and register for upper-level CD courses. Applications are due November 30/April 30 following completion of the first 5 courses above.
- Foreign Language requirement may be met by taking 9 hours in one language or 6 hours in one language and CD 461, Sign Language.
- · Students must seek permission to register for CD courses (with the exception of CD 101) from their academic advisor.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- Have a minimum of 120 credit hours (some colleges or majors require more); · Have an overall and Marshall Grade Point
- Average of 2.00 or higher; • Have an overall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher in the major area of study;
- Have earned a grade of C or better in English 201 or 201 H;
- Have met all major(s) and college requirements:
- Have met the requirements of the Core Curriculum;
- Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia twoyear institution of higher education.

Colleges and specific programs may have unique requirements that are more stringent than those noted above. Students are responsible for staying informed about and ensuring that they meet the requirements for graduation.
