## MAJOR INFORMATION

- Students are required to know and track their degree requirements for graduation or for entrance to a professional school.
- In addition to the Core General Education requirements, the College of Science requires 40 hours of upper level credit.
- Coursework listed as "elective" may vary for each student. Students are encouraged to use elective hours toward a minor or toward prerequisites.
- Students are encouraged to complete an internship in the area of emphasis (CJ 490) in the summer before their senior year. Internships require approval from the CJ Department Chair.
- Course offerings and course attributes are subject to change. Please consult each semester's schedule of courses for availability and attributes.
- Areas of Emphasis: 24 hours (18 hours in AoE plus 6 hours CJ coursework outside AoE; CJ 200, 302, 322, 404 and 492 do not count toward the 18 AoE or the 6 additional CJ electives.)
- <u>Law Enforcement</u>: CJ 211 and 15 hours from: CJ 300, CJ 312, CJ 314, CJ 323, CJ 400, CJ 406, CJ 410, CJ 416, CJ 424, CJ 426, or CJ 490. Other options that may be used with permission from the department chair may include, but are not limited to, CJ 325, CJ 340, CJ 341, CJ 351, and CJ 440.
- Legal Studies: CJ 221 and 15 hours from: CJ 223, CJ 323, CJ 400, CJ 422, CJ 424,  $\mbox{CJ}$  426, or  $\mbox{CJ}$  490. Other options that may be used with permission from the department chair may include, but are not limited to, CJ 325, CJ 341, CJ 406, CJ 416,
- Corrections: CJ 231 and 15 hours from: CJ 325, CJ 331, CJ 332, CJ 400, CJ 406, CJ 433, or CJ 490. Other options that may be used with permission from the department chair may include, but are not limited to, CJ 300, CJ 340, CJ 341, and CJ 426.
- General: Students who do not select an area of emphasis take both CJ 211 and CJ 231 as well as a variety of criminal justice electives to suit their career interests to complete the 24 hours of CJ electives.

- · Have an overall and Marshall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher;
- Have an overall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher in the major area of study;
- Have earned a grade of C or better in English 201 or 201 H;
- · Have met all major(s) and college requirements:
- Have met the requirements of the Core Curriculum:
- · Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- · Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia twoyear institution of higher education.

Colleges and specific programs may have unique requirements that are more stringent than those noted above. Students are responsible for staying informed about and ensuring that they meet the requirements for graduation.
