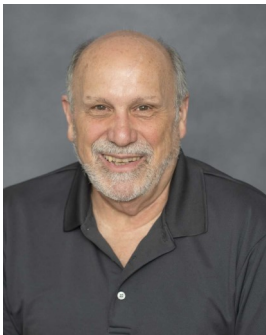

Dr. Fred Roth



A native of New York, Dr. Roth received his doctorate from the University of Connecticut (2002).

His publica-

tions and research interests focused on comparative criminology, policing, social deviance, and underdevelopment. He was employed at Marshall University in 2001 where he taught over 200 courses in Introductory Sociology, Deviance, Criminology, and Juvenile Delinquency. He per-

formed vital roles in the Sociology and Anthropology Department such as Graduate Program Director. He also served as a committee member or chaired several master's theses. Students know and appreciate him for his academic guidance and quick wit. Our department will never be able to replace the personality that is Fred, and we wish our friend well on his retirement in South Africa.

Jeff McKay

Jeff McKay, a two-time graduate of Marshall with an M.A. and B.A. in Sociology, was recently named Marshall University's Distinguished Young Alumnus.

Since graduation, Jeff has changed the beer culture of Huntington. He founded Huntington's first craft beer bar and helped found Huntington's Rails and Ales Festival and the Wild and Wonderful Winter Beer Fest. Jeff also lobbied state



leaders to change beer laws for the better, bringing additional business to the Mountain

State. Jeff is the owner of Summit Beer Station located in downtown Huntington.
